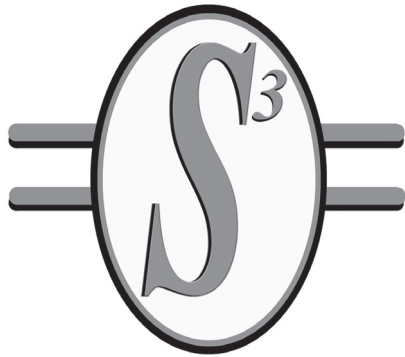

Hugh Ball

President, Greater Limestone County Chamber of Commerce

Mr. Ball graduated from Furman University in Greenville, S.C. in 1962 with a B.S. degree in physics and a commission in the U.S. Army. He is a graduate of the original Ordnance Guided Missile School on Redstone Arsenal and served, among other assignments, as commander of a direct support air defense missile detachment in South Korea.

He was discharged at Redstone Arsenal in 1965. Mr. Ball was employed by Sperry Rand Corporation in Huntsville as an aerospace engineer. He conducted performance analyses of flight control systems for launch vehicles and spacecraft with primary emphasis on the Apollo space program. He earned an MBA from Alabama A&M University in 1975.

From 1976 until 1995, he was employed by Intergraph Corporation. At Intergraph, he directed the corporate customer training program and later the federal system engineering organization associated with the development and support of interactive computer graphics design systems. He retired from Intergraph Corporation in 1995 to pursue personal business and community service interests.

Mr. Ball has served as president of the Greater Limestone County Chamber of Commerce since February of 2005.

Col. John A. Olshefski

Colonel John A. Olshefski was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the United States Army at The Citadel, The Military College of South Carolina, Charleston, South Carolina, in July 1980.

After a two-year stint as a civilian working for Honeywell, Inc., Phoenix, Arizona, while serving in the Arizona National Guard, he decided to change careers and join the Active Army in August 1982. His duty assignments include: Aide-de-Camp, 200 TAMMC, Zweibruecken, Germany; Shop Officer, B Company, 3rd Forward Support Battalion (FSB), 3rd Infantry Division (Mechanized), Aschaffenburg, Germany; Battalion Support Operations Officer, S-3, and B Company Commander, 115th FSB, 1st Cavalry Division, Fort Hood, Texas; Training with Industry, FMC Corporation, San Jose, Calif.; Operations/Training Advisor for the Royal Saudi Land Forces Ordnance Corps, Ordnance Program Division, Riyadh, Saudi Arabia; Division Materiel Management Officer and Executive Officer, 24th FSB, 24th Infantry Division (Mechanized), Fort Stewart, Ga.; Logistics Analyst, Special Operations Requirement/Resources Division, Headquarters, United States Special Operations Command, MacDill AFB, Fla.; Commander, 2nd FSB and Division G4, 2nd Infantry Division, Republic of Korea; Executive Officer for the Sustainment Director Army G4; the Deputy C4 for the Coalition Forces Land Component Command (CFLCC), Camp Arifjan, Kuwait. COL Olshefski took command of the United States Army Garrison, Redstone Arsenal in June 2005.

Colonel Olshefski is a graduate of the Signal Officer Basic Course, Ordnance Advanced Course, Combined Arms Services Staff School, Logistics Executive Development Course, Command and General Staff College, Central Michigan (Masters of Science, Administration), and Industrial College of Armed Forces of (Masters Science in National Resource Strategy).

Brigadier General Patrick J. O'Reilly is the Deputy Director for the Missile Defense Agency with the mission to develop a capability to defend the United States, its deployed forces, allies and friends from ballistic missile attacks of all ranges and in all phases of flight.

He has held a variety of Army operational command and staff positions in the United States and in Europe; and was an assistant professor of physics at the U.S. Military Academy. He has been the Program Manager for PATRIOT PAC-3, Theater High Altitude Area Defense and Ground Based Mid-course Defense programs and the Army's Program Executive Officer for Combat Support and Combat Service Support.

General O'Reilly was commissioned in the U.S. Army Ordnance Corps upon graduation from the U.S. Military Academy. He has earned Masters Degrees in Physics, National Security and Strategic Studies, and Business and is a graduate of the U.S. Naval College of Command and Staff; and the U.S. Army War College.

Dr. Richard Amos became Deputy to the Commanding General, U.S. Army Aviation and Missile Life-Cycle Management Command (AMCOM) July 2004. As Deputy to the Commanding General, Dr. Amos manages a multifaceted and diverse organization with an annual budget of over \$4B and a global workforce of over 11,000 military and civilian employees. He is a recognized leader foremost as well as a manager, logistician, engineer and entrepreneur throughout the Army. He is challenged daily with outlining policies and objectives, formulating broad logistical, managerial, and technical plans, and reinventing processes necessary to accomplish the Command mission.

Dr. Amos was promoted into the Senior Executive Service in October 2000 and served as the Director of the System Simulation and Development Directorate, Aviation and Missile Research, Development, and Engineering Center (AMRDEC). In this position, he was responsible for all modeling and simulation support for Aviation, Missile, and Unmanned Systems. He also directed the AMRDEC's research and development activities in missile and fixed-wing UAV Aerodynamics.

Dr. Amos holds a Bachelor's degree in Industrial Engineering from Auburn University, a Masters of Science degree in Engineering Management from the University of Alabama in Huntsville, and a Doctor of Philosophy degree in System Engineering from the University of Alabama in Huntsville.

Robert L. Harrison

*Special Assistant to the Executive Deputy to the Commanding General,
Headquarters U. S. Army Materiel Command*

Mr. Harrison is primarily focused on the Installations, Facilities, and Future Industrial Capabilities aspects of the Deputy Chief of Staff G-5/G-9, U. S. Army Materiel Command (AMC). As such, he assists the Executive Deputy to the Commanding General (EDCG) and the Deputy Commanding General (DCG) AMC in advising the Commanding General on organization and management matters, providing stationing transformation through Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC), and other initiatives to create an effective AMC footprint for the future.

Mr. Harrison was commissioned as an Infantry officer in 1978 after he earned a Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering from the U. S. Military Academy, West Point, NY. He earned a Masters Degree (with Distinction), National Security and Strategic Studies from the U. S. Naval War College in Newport, RI in 2001. He served three tours in the Army G-3/5/7, HQDA, Washington, DC: as Senior Program and Budgeting Analyst; Division Chief, Collective Training; and Division Chief, Leader Development.

Mr. Harrison served in a variety of command and staff positions in the 9th Infantry Division, 82nd Airborne Division, 3rd Ranger Battalion, 75th Ranger Regiment, Joint Special Operations Command, 2nd Ranger Battalion, 10th Mountain Division, and Army Staff. Mr. Harrison deployed in support of operations URGENT FURY (Grenada), DESERT SHIELD/DESERT STORM (SWA), and UPHOLD DEMOCRACY (Haiti).

Mr. Harrison's awards and decorations include 24 meritorious achievement and commendation awards, as an installation commander, earned the distinction of an Army Community of Excellence, and his Battalion earned first runner up in the Army's Award for Maintenance Management.

Michael Schexnayder

Deputy to the Commander for Research, Development & Acquisition, USASMDC/ARSTRAT

Michael (Mike) C. Schexnayder is the Deputy to the Commander for Research, Development and Acquisition (RD&A) at the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command / U.S. Army Forces Strategic Command (USASMDC/ARSTRAT) located in Redstone Arsenal, Ala.

As the deputy to the commander, Mr. Schexnayder manages SMDC/ARSTRAT's RD&A activities and oversees all materiel development functions, test and evaluation activities, and simulations support including the Space and Missile Defense Future Warfare Center, the Space and Missile Defense Technical Center which includes the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll/Reagan Test Site in the Marshall Islands and the High Energy Laser Systems Test Facility located at White Sands Missile Range, N.M., and the Technical Interoperability and Matrix Center. He also serves as the Head of Contracting Activity.

Prior to this, Mr. Schexnayder served as the Associate Director for Systems in the Aviation and Missile Research and Development Center and as the Director of the Technical Management Directorate.

Mr. Schexnayder joined the Army Missile Lab in 1979. He initially served as an electronics engineer in the millimeter wave radar branch of the Advanced Sensors Directorate. He joined the Structures Directorate in 1981 to establish a capability to support the synergistic integration of missile delivery technology with warhead and fuze technology.

Mr. Schexnayder received the Army Research and Development Award in 1988 and 1993 and served as the deputy director of the Systems Simulation and Development Directorate, Missile Research, Development and Engineering Center from May 1997 until February 1999 when he was selected to the Senior Executive Service.

Lucia Cape

Vice President - Workforce, Chamber of Commerce of Huntsville/Madison County

Lucia Cape was named Vice President for Workforce at the Chamber of Commerce of Huntsville/Madison County in October 2006. She was charged with establishing the Chamber's new Workforce division in response to the workforce challenges brought on by the region's economic growth, including the 2005 Base Realignment and Closure Act that is bringing thousands of jobs to Redstone Arsenal.

Prior to joining the Chamber staff, Ms. Cape was a contractor to the Marshall Space Flight Center's Academic Affairs Office from 2002-2006 where she worked in informal education, including business/industry partnerships.

From 1999-2002 she was a Presidential Management Intern and then a contractor to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in Atlanta, focusing on public health partnerships, communication, workforce and law.

She worked as a technical editor for environmental contractors to the U.S. Army Space and Strategic Defense Command in the mid 1990s.

While earning her bachelor's degree in journalism from the University of Georgia, Ms. Cape interned with the *Huntsville News* and then served as the paper's design director before the paper was closed in 1996.
